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the heavy lifting. Even more importantly, they took the message to the membership and brought members up to speed on the reality of good management. A big move forward SRM made this year was updating our Investment policy and hiring a new investment firm. Chuck Jarecki, Allen Rasmussen, Paul Loeffler, Martin Curry, Tom Bartlett, and Curtis Talbot put in hours of hard work and harder thought to align SRM's investments with SRM's current strategies and objectives.

Thanks go out to Walter Fick, Curtis Talbot, and Paul Loeffler for their leadership on the Finance Committee during challenging times. SRM owes a lot to this committee for submitting balanced budgets by making cuts that would still allow SRM to accomplish its mission.

YouTube on the Range - Rangeland Stewardship

To kick off the new year we're highlighting BLM New Mexico's tribute to rancher Joe Stell, recipient of its 2011 Rangeland Stewardship Award. This 11 ½ minute feature opens with a "western" musical score suitable to its subject, as is sustained throughout by the same folksy narration familiar to fans of Hope on the Range (Bonus Question: Who is that unseen personality on the voice track?). Using then-and-now comparative photography (and with illustrative examples of before and after treatment monitoring) we see the New Mexico range unadorned and in its "work clothes," in the past not always at its



best but clearly today on its way to getting much better. We hear from a spectrum of range folk, both public and private, straight-forwardly singing the praises of a rancher who's "risky" act of "taking a chance" a number of years ago has lead to the remarkable achievement in collaborative cross-boundary management that is known as "Restore New Mexico" today.

The film concludes with a moving thank you from Mr. Stell who accepts his award not for himself, but on "behalf of you people," all the stakeholders in the greater partnership of life on the range.

"Although we are headed down the western slope," he muses, wife Verna proudly beside him, "I wouldn't change any of it!" (be sure to have some tissues on hand!).

Capital Update From Kelly Fogarty



As we start the New Year, it looks as if it will be a year as busy as 2011. While everyone in the Society for Range Management is looking ahead to the annual meeting in Spokane, Washington that is coming up at the end of the month, Washington, D.C. is off and running already in regards to this year's campaign season. This year will without a doubt be dominated by the election cycle. However, 2012 is also the year that must see the passage of the Farm Bill; which, due to a lack of success in the Super Committee process, must now be drafted and passed by the entire Congress. With many elected officials facing a tough re-election, it is going to be an interesting process by which this piece of legislation is formed. Already, it is known that across the board cuts within this comprehensive spending bill will occur, most significantly within the crop insurance, conservation, and commodity titles. How

officials will use the bill and provisions important to their districts as a tool within their campaigns will have a definite effect on the make-up of the final document.

While the 2012 Farm Bill will dominate the first half of the year, its proposed deadline of Memorial Day will leave ample time for other issues to receive possible action throughout the coming year. Issues that will receive attention include: ongoing discussions regarding the management of wild horses on public land, the continuation of the President's America's Great Outdoors Initiative, further review of current endangered species listings, and an increased approach to using public lands for renewable energy sources. The Administration has been active within the Department of Interior this past year, and already, President Obama has quadrupled the number of public lands used to house

renewable energy resources. Also, as of January 3, 2012, new conservation easements allotted through the America's Great Outdoors Initiative have already been awarded to improving the state of multiple wetland areas across the country.


With this in mind, it looks, at least for now, that 2012 may be headed along a similar path as was followed in Washington, D.C. throughout 2011, one that centers on a more agency-driven approach to regulatory issues; but, as with Washington, you can never be quite sure which way things will go in the end. However, the agencies have already lined out several projects and initiatives for the year, and as many are focused on public lands and conservation practices, I will keep all of you informed as these projects unfold as we dive into 2012.

Rangeland Literature Synthesis

Conservation Benefits of Rangeland Practices: Assessment, Recommendations, and Knowledge Gaps

The rangeland literature synthesis provides an unprecedented source of evidence-based information to guide the development and assessment of management practices and conservation programs on the nation's rangelands. It assesses the effectiveness of seven NRCS-recommended rangeland conservation practices: Prescribed Grazing, Prescribed Fire, Brush Management, Range Planting, Riparian Management Practices, Wildlife Management Practices, and Invasive Plant Management. Also assessed were two cross-cutting issues: A landscape approach to rangeland conservation, and a social and economic assessment of rangeland conservation practices. All recipes must be original recipes (never published). If it is a published recipe it must be changed by 10%, (such as changing an ingredient or amount, adding an ingredient, changing cooking temperature or time.)

Featured Recipe Of The Month: From: Trail Boss's Cowboy Cookbook, 1985 Alice L. Eider North Dakota

ROAST BEEF PARTY LOGS

2 lbs. boneless beef chuck roast, cubed 2 tbsp. cooking oil 2 c. water

1 ½ tsp. salt½ tsp. pepper¼ tsp. ground allspice2/3 c. mayonnaise½ c. chopped celery¼ c. sweet pickle relish1 tbsp. steak sauce2 8-oz. pkg cream cheese1 c. shredded cheddar cheese

1 tbsp. chopped pimento2 tbsp. chopped green pepper2 c. chopped pecans½ c. paprika2 4-oz. pkg. whipped cream cheese with chives

Brown beef in oil in heavy 4 to 5 qt. pan or dutch oven. Add water, salt, pepper and allspice. Bring to a boil; reduce heat to medium low. Cover and cook for approximately 1½ hours or until tender (If desired a pressure pan may be used; reduce water to 1 cup and cook according to manufacturer's directions.) Remove beef from cooking liquid; cool. Grind beef. Combine beef, mayonnaise, celery, relish and steak sauce; mix well. Divide into 12 portions; shape each portion into a "log" approximately 5 in. long. Press mixture firmly to hold shape. Refrigerate while preparing cream cheese. Combine cream cheese, whipped cream cheese, cheddar cheese, green pepper and pimento; mix well. Spread cheese mixture over each log, covering well. Sprinkle with paprika and roll in nuts. Chill until firm enough to slice. (In freezer, allow approximately 15 min. or 45 to 60 min. in refrigerator.) Slice logs as needed, cutting each into approximately 12 slices. Garnish with cherry tomatoes, green onions and parsley. Serve with assorted crackers and horseradish mustard, if desired. Yield: approximately 144 appetizers. Note: logs freeze well so can be made well in advance.

2012 Rangeland Careers

The demand for professionals who can manage rangelands is currently very high. Nearly all students graduating with degrees in range science & management are finding opportunities for jobs. Many mid-career professionals also appear to be switching to rangeland management as a second career choice. Though the demand for quality new recruits appears high, there also appears to be a decreasing supply of job-ready seniors from university programs.

The Society for Range Management (SRM) is concerned about the future management of rangelands. We are especially concerned about the future of the workforce dedicated to managing these lands. Information from the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) reveals that at least 30% of the workforce currently classified as "Rangeland Management Specialists" (i.e. 454-series) within the US Forest Service (USFS), Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will likely retire in the next 10 years. Who will fill their shoes?

In order to address these concerns, SRM plans to once again expand its job hiring and career development opportunities at the 65th SRM Annual Meeting and Trade Show in Spokane, WA, Jan. 29-Feb. 3, 2012. The temporary structure in the foreground of the picture may provide a hint of the disturbance that took place here. What function does that structure perform and what is the purpose of the rolled geo-tex along the edge?


December Quiz Answer: It seems everyone was too busy doing their online holiday shopping last month to answer our rangeland engineering edition of the SRM Photo Quiz. But no matter: the stream is crossed by a natural gas pipeline. The structure in the foreground is a "wetland crossing" con-

structed of linked heavy timbers for use by heavy equipment traveling the pipeline corridor. It is composed of two layers of heavy timbers with a layer of geo-textile between so that dirt from the tracks of dozers and track hoes does not filter down into the stream. The excess geo-tex is rolled on each side of the wetland crossing for the same purpose--it serves to keep dirt from falling off the side into the stream.

We thank Thomas Matza of the Bridger Teton National Forest for this sampling of out-of-the-box engineering. We'd like to get some timely updates on how well it's worked (and see what it all looks like after a couple years – pipelines transiting rangelands is fast becoming a hot topic!

The project was a roughly 25 mile long, large (20"), natural gas pipeline that originated in a gas field located on private land and crossed portions of two national forests and BLM in Colorado.

The picture was taken in August of 2009. I cannot tell you exactly how the area looks now because I left that NF to come up here to Wyoming, a year-and-a-half ago. I served as the Authorized Officer, representing both the Forest Service and the BLM, during the two years of construction.



The wetland protection is dictated by the US Army Corps of Engineers under the Clean Water Act. All designated wetland areas in the construction corridor were covered by the heavy-timber crossing protection. This kept all equipment from the largest track hoes down to ATVs from wallowing in and out of wet areas causing damage both at the site as well as sediment transport down stream.

When they reached a stream, such as the one in the picture, they would construct a dam to hold water out of the pipeline crossing. Using a pump and flexible pipe, they would pump water around the construction area and on down the stream channel. They would trench in the pipe, do the rehab work as illustrated in the picture, then remove the temporary dam. The wetland crossing bridge and shown in the picture stays in place as long as there is construction traffic in the corridor--then it is removed.
