#### **Smorgasbord** By Don Kirby, SRM Second Vice President

I'm back. It's not that I went anywhere, or at least anywhere exotic (North Dakota), but I did get three years off the Board to get my sanity and strength back for another three-year term.

I need to explain the title "Smorgasbord". Smorgasbord is a Scandinavian term meaning "open table" or "a large heterogeneous mixture". Growing up in California and Texas, my family occasionally went to supper at a *buffet* or an *all-you-can-eat joint*. It took moving to North Dakota and marrying a Scandinavian woman to learn that smorgasbord was really just a north country term for *all-you-can-eat joint*.

By this time you might be asking "What does smorgasbord have to do with the SRM?" In an expanded sense, smorgasbord can refer to an allvolunteer organization such as SRM that has a large "open table" of issues as well as "a large heterogeneous mixture" of members to confront these issues. Therefore, you might say that we, the Board, Advisory Council, Committee members, and the membership at large are presented with many complex issues on our plates at the "open table" each year. Many of these issues are not well known or articulated to those not on the front lines. I want to use this space to make you aware of some of the issues the Board is working on. After three years of blissful ignorance, I am now privileged to be up to my neck in a swamp surrounded by alligators. Not really, but I will let you in on two of the issues the Board and Society are constantly dealing with.

The first is finances. Budgeting is an on-going process facing the Board. The Society has assets but most of these are essentially fixed for various purposes such as the headquarters building and land, furniture and equipment, and endowment and scholarship funds. The major annual sources of income that the Society operates on are membership dues, Annual Meeting profits, and *REM* subscriptions. There are others but they are minor compared to those named. Major annual expenses are staff salaries and benefits, publication costs, and office and travel costs associated with doing business. Again, there are other expenses but they are minor compared to those named. Having a fiscal responsibility to the membership, the Board developed a break-even annual balance sheet based on a membership of 3,200 and an Annual Meeting income of \$50,000 or greater. Despite the conservative nature of this budgeting, unexpected expenses still play havoc with the Society's balance sheet from year to year.

The second issue is membership. Many hours and much discussion have been spent on this issue. Simply put, we need to recruit and retain new members and then provide the suite of services to the membership that they need to be successful in life and a career. Many of these services have been developed and provided in the recent past such as the finest, most diverse Annual Meeting program offered, CPRM program, partnerships with other conservation societies, meetings with federal agencies, and positioning of the EVP in Washington, DC. There are also activities specifically designed for the young professionals such as the Young Professionals Conclave, Rangeland Cup competition, and the On-the-Spot hiring by federal agencies at our Annual Meeting. More members' service opportunities are being discussed and will be implemented in the future. For your part, please consider giving the Board a hand at recruiting new members. Make a goal this year of signing up one new member and we will all benefit.

In closing, thank you for the opportunity to serve you and the Society over the next three years.

# New Forage Selection Tool Available Submitted by Julie MacKenzie

An excellent new forage selection tool is now available through the Saskatchewan Forage Council. The interactive CD is designed to allow land managers to investigate a variety of potential forage species. Ideal

species can be selected based on soil texture and soil environment, longevity of the stand, and purpose of the forage. Forty-five species, both tame and native, are included on the CD. Each species includes photos and a detailed description including yields, recommended stocking rates, and other management information. Seeding rates and seed cost calculators are also included.

#### **Range Plant-Animal Interactions Scientist**

The Department of Animal Biotechnology in the College of Agriculture, Biotechnology in the College of Agriculture, Biotechnology and Natural Resources is currently seeking to fill a position for a Range Plant-Animal Interactions Scientist. This is a tenure track position for which the successful candidate will be expected to develop a dynamic undergraduate teaching program in rangeland plant-animal interactions and an extramurally funded research program. The position will contribute to the UNR Rangeland Livestock Production Team that provides multidisciplinary approaches to teaching, research and outreach within the field of range animal production. This position requires a PhD in Range Science or Range Animal Science. The incumbent must demonstrate knowledge and understanding of domestic animal grazing systems, wildlife interactions, invasive weed control and animal diet preferences. The successful candidate will be expected to have a broad background to issues relating to arid rangeland herbivory, successional models and how plant community composition is affected by domestic and wild herbivores. ### Noxious Weeds Targeted in Colorado Eastern Plains

Six noxious weed species are targets for intensive management in Colorado's Eastern High Plains. The new, 3-year program is funded by the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) under the Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative. The Colorado Department of Agriculture will administer and implement the program.

The six weed species are: dalmatian toadflax, leafy spurge, diffuse knapweed, Russian knapweed and spotted knapweed. Saltcedar will be targeted only in the Republican River Watershed under this program. For additional information on this program, log onto


